Surgery Center Contributes \$1 million to Virginia's Free Clinics

Charity Care Condition Provides Welcome Support

The Surgery Center of Lynchburg made history with a recent contribution of more than \$1 million to the Virginia Association of Free & Charitable Clinics (VAFCC). This represents the largest single charity care contribution in both the Surgery Center's and the Association's history and will fund the provision of health care services (medical, dental, mental health, and pharmaceutical) to uninsured and medically underserved patients.

The vast majority of this funding will go to the Center's local clinic, the Free Clinic of Central Virginia. Twelve free clinics in the state will also receive a portion of the funding. **"The Surgery Center has long been a strong partner of the Free Clinic. This very generous charity care contribution, shared with the other free clinics in our region, is a real game-changer for our neighbors who need the high-quality healthcare provided by free clinics,"** says Christina Delzingaro, CEO of the Free Clinic. "At a time when the Free Clinic of Central Virginia is taking care of more patients than ever, support from the Surgery Center will make it possible for us to serve even more—especially as we are getting ready to embark on a renovation to our Main Street location. A gift of this magnitude will make a huge difference."

"These clinics are a lifesaving investment and play an important role in safeguarding our region's sickest, most vulnerable, and voiceless," reports Tim Courville, who serves on the Board of Managers of the Surgery Center along with Drew Kiernan, Peter Caprise, Jay Burks, and Chris Thomson. **"We are pleased to support clinics that allow vulnerable individuals to regain their health so they can care for their families and continue to contribute to our community."**

Expanding to Better Serve ALICE

What is ALICE? ALICE stands for Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed – households that earn more than the Federal Poverty Level, but less than the basic cost of living. The United Way of Central Virginia participated in a national data project, ALICE, which provides a comprehensive measure of financial hardship across our region. Data from the 2018 ALICE report shows a family of four would need to earn \$66,096 per year to cover basic living costs. Over 32,500 households in our region earn less than the basic cost of living.

The Free Clinic recognizes that costs, especially medical costs, have risen faster than wages for most people. At the same time, more and more small businesses are finding it hard to afford insurance premiums for their employees and have had to discontinue this important benefit. To ensure that every member of our community receives high-quality, compassionate and comprehensive healthcare, the Free Clinic will now be serving adults with incomes up to 250% of the Federal Poverty Level. This change increases the amount of income a family of four can earn to \$64,375, and the amount of income a single adult can earn to \$31,225.

In the coming months, the Free Clinic will be engaged in focused outreach efforts to local small businesses, individuals employed in the hospitality industry, and adults enrolled in higher education. We will be developing enrollment programs specifically to encourage those who might earn too much to be eligible for Medicaid, but not enough to afford costly medical care. We are excited to extend the care of our volunteers to more families.

Free Clinic Board Adopts New Strategic Plan

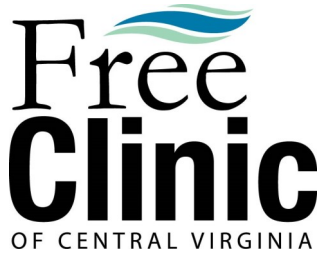
The Free Clinic of Central Virginia has adopted a new strategic plan to inform the operations of the clinic through 2025. As part of the planning process, the Board updated the Free Clinic’s mission and vision statements to highlight our focus on providing comprehensive, patient-centered care, as well as our role within the overall healthcare system of our community.

Key strategic initiatives in the new plan include identifying and filling gaps in access to care, even with Medicaid expansion, expanding patient education programs, and improving our facility at 1016 Main Street.
